LANGUAGE ARTS CORNER- Encouraging Students to Read by Dawn Moan-Minott, Language Arts Coach

It's boring. I don't have the time. It's too hard. It's not important. It's no fun. These are just some of the reasons students give who do not like to read. Studies have shown that the more students read the more fluent they become, which leads to children reading for pleasure.

How do we encourage students to read? The latest article on the Reading is Fundamental website (www.rif.org/parents/articles/ ChildrenWhoDon'tRead.mspx) lists some tactics that have proven not to motivate learning. The following are some actions that will only strengthen your child's resistance to learning:

- Nagging. Hounding and lecturing only create resentment.
- Bribing. Rewarding good habits is beneficial; be careful that your children aren't expecting a treat after every book.
- Judging your child's performance. Differentiate between reading for school, and pleasure reading.
- Criticizing your child's choices. Reading almost anything is better than reading nothing.
- Setting unrealistic goals. Notice small improvements rather than drastic changes in reading ability.
- Making a big deal about reading. Don't make reading a pressured activity.

*Remember that all learning activities should be enjoyable! If an activity is not successful, stop and take a break. The best way to build interest in reading is to provide a positive environment.








A NOTE FROM THE SCHOOL NURSE

A Few Minutes Every Night: Helping Your Child Prepare for Each New Day

I'm sure you've heard the phrase, "It takes a village to raise a child." Scales' staff and teachers are very concerned about your child's future and we put our hearts into his or her academic, emotional, and social growth. But to be effective, we need your help.

We frequently send home school materials on loan so that your child can practice the skills needed to achieve. Specifically, we lend library books, text books, musical instruments, and a wide variety of school materials that were purchased with school funds. These items are costly and should last for many years and serve many families.

By teaching your child to care for items on loan, you are teaching responsibility and respect. These skills will carry them through a lifetime of working and getting along with others. Establishing a nightly habit of checking your child's backpack will ease morning tension and encourage students to start healthy routines on their own. Students who have a

pleasant morning at home with family members are ready to learn as soon as they get to school. Please-

- •Send your child to school with a book bag or backpack to ensure communication with the school.
- •Check your child's backpack, red folder, or assignment agenda nightly.
- •Sign papers that need to be returned the moment you read them, and place them back in the backpack.
- •Be aware of what day your child goes to library. Is their library book in the backpack?
- •Check to see if homework is completed and in the backpack.
- •Read with your child or ask them what they are reading.
- •Encourage practice time for music students. Is their school instrument packed and ready to go back to school?

Decide with your child where they will place their backpack, shoes and clothes to make the morning routine easier. Please contact the school if we can provide you with information that will make your job easier.

If your family will be moving, please return all school items to the school before you move. Your thoughtfulness helps us to educate and provide materials for all children who attend Scales, now and in the future.
