We have been educating our children all year so that they are ready to move to the next level. Our final assessments are a way to gauge what students have learned and provide information on how we can better support them. In the coming months, students will take the AIMS (Arizona Instrument to Measure Standards), NWEA MAP (Measure of Academic Progress), DIBELS (Dynamic Indicator of Basic Early Literacy Skills), and several other *end of the year tests*. While this might seem overwhelming, it is not. It is something that our teachers and students see as a normal part of school. Our students and staff prepare everyday for the challenges ahead, and I am extremely confident in each child's ability to excel. Our partnership --parents, students, and staff-- is the most valuable tool in the preparation process. Open communication, positive reinforcement, and everyday practice will ensure that each student does well. It is critical that every child gets plenty of rest, eats well-balanced meals, and has a healthy balance between physical activity and studying. Parents, please continue to encourage your children throughout the educational process and always praise them for their academic focus and progress. I am honored to work with our teachers, students, and parents to assure that all students reach their achievement goals!

Language Arts Corner: Raíse a Reader By Margaret Arevalo, Títle I Readíng Specialíst

It's important to keep up story time at home as your child learns to read and write at school. Let him pick what he wants to read, but make sure you expose him to a wide variety of genres including folk-tales, fantasy, and nonfiction. Here are some tips to achieve this goal:

- Get your child a library card. Going to the library is a fun adventure. Kids love dropping books into the return slot and making new selections.
- Accept his literary taste. Don't be bummed if all he'll read is Bob the Builder books. What matters most is that kids are reading, and books based on their favorite TV shows are fine.
- Chat them up. Talk about what you've just read. Relate stories back to their own life: "Do you ever feel homesick when you visit Grandma?"
- Publish a book. Staple a few sheets of paper together and ask your child to dictate a story and make some drawings.
- Use reading as a reward. If your child shared nicely, treat him to an extra story or two and some special cuddle time. (Excerpts from <u>Parents</u> Magazine, March 2008)

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A NOTE FROM THE NURSE

10 REASONS TO TAKE YOUR CHILD TO THE DOCTOR OR KEEP HIM/HER HOME FROM SCHOOL:

- 1) A FEVER OVER 100.F
- 2) A PERSISTENT COUGH (for more than 1 week)
- 3) VOMITING AT HOME BEFORE SCHOOL OR DURING THE NIGHT
- 4) AN EAR INFECTION OR DRAINAGE FROM THE EAR
- 5) A SERIOUS HEAD INJURY
- 6) PINK EYE (Conjunctivitis-Very contagious!- Report to the nurse)



Symptoms of Pink Eye include itchy, teary, red eyes, sometimes with discharge out of the corner of the eye or stuck to the lashes. A student with Pink Eye must be on antibiotic drops for at least 24 hours, be without eye drainage, and visit the school nurse to receive clearance to return to school.

7) CHICKEN POX (Varicella- Contagious- Report to the nurse)



Nurse must report each outbreak to the State! Most kids are vaccinated, but some may still get a mild case. Chicken Pox starts as fluid-filled, red blisters, and then turns to scabs. Students must be without any blisters and cleared by the nurse before returning to school.

8) IMPETIGO (Contagious- Report to the nurse)



Impetigo is a bacterial infection. Students need antibiotic ointment or oral medication to fight the infection. Sores must be treated and covered while the student is in school. Impetigo is characterized by red bumps, usually around the mouth, with a yellow, oozy, crusty discharge.

9) RINGWORM (Contagious- Report to the nurse)



Ringworm is a fungal infection. It is characterized by red, round, itchy patches on the skin or scalp. Sores must be covered while a student is in school until all of the sores are gone. The infection can be passed from cats, dogs, or other children. It is treated with anti-fungal creams, then with an oral anti-fungal if the sore does not clear up within 1-2 weeks.

10) HEAD LICE (Pediculosis-Contagious- Report to the nurse)



A student with head lice will have an itchy head. He/she will need to be sent home and treated. It can take up to 2 weeks for lice to clear up completely. Students must be seen by the school nurse before school every day until it is cleared up.

<u>New Immunization</u> <u>Requirements for the</u> 2008-2009 School Year

Students entering the 6th grade in the 2008-2009 school year will be required to receive the following immunizations by September 1, 2008.

- (1) A combined vaccine for pertussis and tetanus (Tdap) and
- (2) A vaccine for meningitis (MV). Sixth graders who are not eleven years of age when school starts will be required to receive the immunizations after their eleventh birthday.

Pertussis (whooping cough) and tetanus (lockjaw) vaccines are given to young children in the DTap or DTP vaccine series and to adolescents and adults in the Tdap vaccine. Meningitis is an infection of the fluid in a person's spinal cord and the fluid that surrounds the brain. Meningitis can spread quickly.

In addition, students eleven years and older, who have had 5 years pass since their last tetanus/diphtheria vaccine dose, are required to receive the Tdap immunization.

The nurse at your child's school will be sending immunization referrals as a reminder to make an appointment with your child's doctor or nearby clinic for the needed immunizations. If you have questions, please call the Scales Health Office @ 480-929-9909 ext. 6903
