- 1) Maintain an open line of communication with teachers and the school, and feel free to ask questions or seek help when needed.

- 3) Limit the amount of television (non-educational programs) and video games. Instead, encourage reading and other academic activities
- 4) Show an interest in your child's learning, and ask them about their school day. Studies have shown that parents who show an active interest in what their children are learning help set the stage for a great educational experience.

As we head into the holiday season, it is so important that we are there for our family, show support and encouragement, and continue to stress the importance of education. At school, the students use the **NED Principles, which you can talk to them about and adopt at home.** NED stand for: 1) Never Give up, 2) Encourage Others, 3) Do Your Best. FLU season is coming. A flu shot is recommended for your child.

10 REASONS FOR KEEPING YOUR CHILD HOME FROM SCHOOL and/or TAKING TO DOCTOR:

- 1) FEVER OVER 100.F
- 2) PERSISTENT COUGH (more than 1 week)
- 3) VOMITING or DIARRHEA AT HOME DURING THE NIGHT OR BEFORE SCHOOL
- 4) EAR INFECTION, DRAINAGE
- 5) SERIOUS HEAD INJURY

PINK EYE (Conjunctivitis) Very contagious! Itchy, teary, red eyes, sometimes with discharge out of corner of the eye or stuck to lashes. Before returning to school must be: on antibiotic drops for at least 24 hours, be without eye drainage and be cleared by nurse.

7)

CHICKEN POX (Varicella) Contagious. Let school know. Nurse must report outbreak to the State! Most kids are vaccinated, but some get a mild case.

Starts as fluid-filled, red blisters, then turns to scabs. Must be without any blisters and cleared by nurse before return to school.

8)

IMPETIGO (Contagious) Bacterial infection with red bumps, with yellow oozy, crusty discharge, usually around the mouth. Needs antibiotic ointment and/or oral medication. Must be treated and kept covered while in school. Report to nurse.

9)

RINGWORM (Contagious) A fungal infection with red, round patches, itchy on the skin or scalp. Must be covered in school until all gone. Can get from pets: cats, dogs, or other children. Treated with antifungal creams, then with an oral antifungal if does not clear within a week or two. Report to nurse.

HEAD LICE (Pediculosis) (Contagious) Very itchy head. Will have to be sent home and treated. Takes up to 2 weeks to clear. Must be seen by nurse before school every day until cleared..
